

From the Archives...

A History of Pine Street Lutheran Church

During the week of October 19, 1958, the congregation celebrated the one hundredth anniversary of the laying of the cornerstone of the present church building. The stone was laid May 4, 1858 during the ministry of the Rev. M.J. Stover. Rev. Walter Brown returned to deliver the sermon at the Sunday morning service, which kicked off the anniversary week. The 50 year members of the congregation were honored at a special service held Wednesday evening. On Sunday October 26, the Rev. Dwight F. Putman, President of the Central Pennsylvania Synod of the United Lutheran Church of America was guest preacher. Dr. Putman conducted a most appropriate rededicatory service, which served as the conclusion to the anniversary week.

In 1959 and 1960, the classrooms on the first floor of the parsonage were remodeled. And in 1960, a doorway was cut in the rear right wall of the church building, thus providing for the first time, outside access to the rear of the building and greatly improved fire safety. The church Annual Report for 1960 shows an average attendance of 193, a budget of \$28,000, a debt of \$16,000, and only a fair level of contribution s from the congregation. A sense of stagnant "status quo" seemed to characterize the early sixties. Effective evangelism programs never fully materialized and the program for debt reduction made only very slow progress. Pastor Picking left the ministry in March of 1965 and the Rev. Hans. B. Jentsch accepted the call to Pine Street in October 1965. He saw 1966 as a rebuilding year; and the congregation took new hop, a stronger hold, and progress began to show.

The Thomas Beaver Free Library



A public library plays a vital role in the community it serves and the Thomas Beaver Free Library is no exception. For 130 years, it has stood in the heart of Danville; an essential resource and source of pride for the community.

In 1886, Thomas Beaver contributed \$100,000 for the construction of the library, which now bears his name. The Thomas Beaver Free Library was dedicated in 1888 and has served since then as the library for Danville, Montour County, and Rush and Riverside Townships. It offers educational and cultural enrichment opportunities by

providing materials, services and programs for all ages. It is a place of lifelong learning and enhances the quality of life for all of us.

The Library provides its users with a broad range of books including fiction, non-fiction, large print and audio books. Patrons regularly read newspapers and check out magazines and DVDs from the library's collections. Residents also have access to computers, the internet and databases for conducting research. Wi-Fi is available for people looking for a quiet space to write or work. Its programs promote a love of reading and exploration for everyone from toddlers to seniors.

The Thomas Beaver Free Library provides free space for educational programs and is a gathering place for community groups. It is where people come together to connect with neighbors and where parents, grandparents, and children can share the joy of reading as a family. It is where adult learners gather to improve their reading and language skills. The library has built community bonds beyond its walls by reaching out through Little Libraries, reading to children at preschool and dropping off book at assisted living facilities for seniors to enjoy.



Who We Are:

The Good Samaritan Mission is a faith-based organization created to meet the needs of the economically disadvantaged individuals in Montour County and the Danville School District. The needs are varied: clothing, furniture and financial.

Did You Know?

- So far in 2018, the mission store has logged 5,467 visits by clients seeking clothing.
- Fifty seven percent of crisis fund resources are allocated towards helping qualified clients with rent. Many Hands Helping Others keeps clothing, shoes and winter attire available to kids at every school in Danville Area.
- Since September, more than 260 winter coats have been given away (scarves and hats available as well).

Hygiene Program Launches Successfully

In April of 2018, Good Samaritan Mission launched hygiene a program for our community. Prospective citizens in need can pick up a bag that is filled with deodorant, soap, shampoo, conditioner. body lotion, toothbrush, toothpaste, razors, shaving cream, washcloths and petroleum jelly (Vaseline).

Participants can register, and then participant give-away date takes place of the second Tuesday of each month. Once you receive a bag, you cannot receive another for three months. Since April, more than 390 bags have been given out to those in need. We are delighted to meet this need.

What Are You Worth?

A few years ago, Anne Marie Helmenstine was asked what was the actual value of a human body. Utilizing her chemistry background (PhD), she listed the elements in the body and researched their 2011 market values. She concluded that the average human was worth about a dollar, and if you could tan the skin (hide), you could raise that total to \$4.50 or \$5.00.

James Farris cited a new study, which places the value of a human at 43 million dollars. The difference is not inflation, but in things Anne Marie never thought to consider. Bone marrow, DNA, antibodies, reproductive components, and organs are in great demand and therefore quite expensive.

However, there are aspects of our humanity that can't he price tagged. How do we establish values for dreams or talents? How much is a person worth who discovers a cure for cancer? What is the love for your spouse or child worth? The place we hold in the hearts of those around us truly makes us irreplaceable and therefore priceless.
