A Note From Pastor Martin

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ;

We have heard the story, The Story, the birth of the Messiah, the Holy One of God, Immanuel, God With us, Jesus. This account, from Sacred Scripture seems new every year, mostly because I am different this year than I was last year, because I am another year older, because life is not static, life changes. Even if the changes are subtle, there are changes nevertheless.

This year, while preparing sermons for the Fourth Sunday of Advent and for Christmas Eve, two phrases seemed to be prominent in my reading, both alike, different gospels. From Luke's Gospel, the Angel of the Lord said to Mary: 'do not be afraid.' (Luke 1.20) From 'Matthew's Gospel, the Angel of the Lord said to Joseph: 'do not be afraid' (Matthew 1. 20) Both these messages concerned the Child who was growing within Mary, neither Mary nor Joseph understood how this had occurred.

Do not be afraid, the angel told them, they were about to be parents, there were all kinds of problems concerning this announcement. Problems with what would appear as violations of Jewish law; problems with the legalism that would threaten the life of Mary; problems with 'what people would say'; problems that might jeopardize the decisions both Mary and Joseph were about to make. Yet, how could they do otherwise than go forward with the announcement of the angel.

What kind of trust did it take for them to step into this role as parents to be, and then as parents of a child born in surroundings that defied human understanding. Do not be afraid was the message they must have heard again and again in their mind

and heart as the days wore on for the delivery. Then again, they were warned to leave for the life of the child was at risk. How far does the message 'do not be afraid' go, how much stress and unknown circumstances does it cover?

In many ways, we too are walking into this new year of 2017 with caution. The presidential election left us with surprises that we had not experienced in elections in the past, and it seems, we keep hearing of new surprises. On what shall we base our expectations, our certainty that all will be well, that our way of life and our expectations will continue?

There are other unknown issues that we face, they are part of normal life changes and challenges, some of them welcome, some of them unwelcome. Can we hear the Word of God coming to us and telling us, 'do not be afraid'? Can we, like Mary and Joseph, trust in the Lord, our newborn King, Immanuel, God With Us, and have courage, sing a song of love to God for all we have, for the people in our lives who reflect this love back to us, for this Church, where the love of God is witnessed day in and day out?

We may be thinking about New Year Resolutions, and it we are, may we resolve to hear the words of the Angel of the Lord, 'Do Not Be Afraid.'

Wednesday Afternoon Crafters

Are you devastated by the overwhelming conditions of God's children you see every day on the news? Refugees, victims of natural disaster or political upheavals.... You can do a small part to help make those people more comfortable by sharing in making Lutheran World Relief Mission Quilts, and other simple projects. Our goal has been to use repurposed materials to make the quilts.

We have had lots of fabric stored at Pine Street Lutheran. Over the last few months we have cut enough 21 inch squares from this fabric to make up to 13 quilts. In addition to the squares to make the "top" of the quilts, we need "fill" in the form of old blankets, and "backs" in the form of flat twin size sheets. The completed "sandwich" will measure 60 by 80 inches. We will then tie the quilt at the corner of each square, and sew the edges. Do you have any of the following to help us complete our quilts?

Twin sheets in good shape ~Blankets in any condition (they will be sandwiched between "top" and "back")

After cutting the fabric to make 21 inch squares, there are still smaller pieces of fabric that could be cut into 6 inch squares to make more quilts. We have five boxes full of such fabric. If you are unable to come on Wednesdays, are you interested in taking home a box and cutting 6 inch squares at your leisure? (Some of the fabric may need a quick ironing.)

We have a good time chatting and working on Wednesdays. Don't think that you have to be a seamstress to help out. There's always ironing, cutting, and tying going on. And maybe you'd like to see how that sewing machine actually works...it's really not that hard

If we get all those quilts assembled, we have stashed away fabric to make Little Dresses out of pillowcases, Fabric Kits, and School Kit Backpacks. Also, we have a table full of yarn to make prayer shawls, or other projects of your choice. Help yourself.

Why not Simply Giving?


